• JUSTICE ACADEMY

Dates: May 30 – June 1

This experience will cover all aspects of criminal justice, law enforcement and the legal system. If you are interested in justice studies and government, you will benefit from attending this exciting and engaging camp experience.

- Participate in campus activities led by the Chandler Police Department including: Gang Unit, Canine Demo, SWAT and Motors Unit
- Role play, covering the process from warrant execution to arrest, booking, jail and trial

• ACCELERATED INNOVATION

Dates: June 6 – 8 or June 18 – 20

This immersive, hands-on engineering experience will give you the opportunity to explore biomedical, electrical and mechanical engineering within our state-of-the-art facilities. Gain and further your understanding of computer-aided design, build electronic and biomedical devices, enhance your programming skills, participate in destructive testing and utilize advanced engineering equipment.
